
NEW CLEAN COAL PLANT

Consumers Energy's proposed new clean coal project in Hampton Township continues on track. The utility is pursuing changes to Michigan's energy policy laws in the State Legislature as a requirement before it commits to going forward with the \$2 billion plus plant. Our local legislators, Representative Jeff Mayes (D-Bangor Township) and Senator Jim Barcia (D-Bay City) are taking leadership roles in pursuing the needed legislative changes, which we hope to see passed by mid-year. Your Township

Board passed a resolution of support for the legislative changes and for approval of the new plant, which would mean a positive state-wide economic impact of \$1.2 billion over a seven year period in

terms of construction jobs, purchases and tax payments.

Consumers issued an economic impact study which also showed a positive economic impact of more than \$67 million per year once the plant enters operation. Consumers application for an air permit for the new plant is currently being reviewed by the MDEO.



WATER & SEWER TALKS

Sewer negotiations are at a critical point this year. We have been waiting for a contract draft from Bay City. We have been a customer with Bay City since 1961.

Our option to join with the Bay County waste treatment is still open - we are in the process of updating figures now to compare to the offer from Bay City.

The question now is will Bay City be able to bring to the table a contract that is just and a rate that is fair for Hampton Township customers so that we can continue this business relationship? The answer to that question is drawing near and we will keep you updated as we progress with the talks.

DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY CENTER AVENUE BEAUTIFICATION PROJECT UPDATE

The DDA Center Ave Beautification project is near completion. New signal light strain poles will be installed this year at the intersections of Center & Scheurmann & Center & Pine Roads.

What a difference these improvements have made for our business area. Soon, two new businesses will be moving into

the area and hopefully there are more on the way.

Thank you to the business owners and residents of this area for your cooperation and patience while the work on this project was being accomplished.

Pine Street

The Pine Street project will start sometime in April and finish by the end of August. We ask the residents to be patient during this construction period.

The corner of Pine and Center Roads will be redesigned for four lanes. New signal poles and lights will also be added.

North of the corner of Pine and Center the four lanes turn into three lanes as they head north to Nebobish, with the center lane designated as a turning lane. Also curb and gutter will be installed on both sides with a sidewalk on the East side for pedestrians.

This is being done to add to the safety for vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

We feel that this upgrade will blend in nicely to our Center Ave Beautification project.

This is an approximate 45% increase in payments from 2006. The additional money helps in the operation of the township throughout the year. It is the equivalent of $1\ 1/2$ additional payments of state revenues.

DPW UPDATE

The DPW has had a busy winter already - old time winter has returned with a vengeance.

The DPW has been busy trying to keep up with plowing the secondary roads. It has been difficult with the deep, blowing and drifting snow and down right cold weather conditions.

Along with plowing the roads, they have also kept the rail trail plowed, repaired water line breaks and cleared sewer obstructions.

Your patience is requested during this time.

Our DPW workers have a difficult job to do while working in these unpredictable conditions. They run the possibility of getting stuck in the snow themselves or in an accident while trying to keep the roads clean for the residents on a timely schedule.

The DPW purchased a new bucket truck and a small versatile tractor for sub contracting with the DDA on maintenance that is needed in the business district

area.

NATURE TRAIL

The Nature Trail has been completed starting from Finn Road Park meandering through to the West side of Knight Road halfway to Jones Road

It is our hope to extend the nature trail farther west and eventually connect with the rail trail. In order to make this a reality, we will have to pursue funds from various agencies.

The Trail that we have in place was constructed through a matching funds grant from the DEQ Coastal Management, with our DPW providing all of the work.

The Saginaw Bay Land Conservancy Council also provided help with a land purchase.

We thank those individuals from these two agencies for helping us making the outdoors and nature available to everyone to enjoy.

Wood Memorial Park

As many of you may know The Lee Wood Family has been a large part of Hampton Township. With the sudden death of Melvin Wood in 2007, his friends and neighbors would like to leave a lasting memorial to him and The Wood Family.

Through donations from Lee Wood Contracting, local area businesses and friends of the family, The Wood Memorial project will expand the current rail trail park on Youngsditch between Pine and Scheurmann.

Additions planned are a paved parking lot, pavilion and a playground.

Phase One started in October. Included in this were the surveying and the preparing of the ground for upcoming asphalt done by McFarland Trucking.

The next meeting will be March 4th at 7:00 p.m. at Hampton Township. All volunteers are welcome.

The next phase will be fundraising and then come spring we will be working on asphalt and landscaping.

POLICE DEPARTMENT UPDATE

We are still experiencing a number of Larcenies from Automobiles. Most of those vehicles are left unlocked with valuables sitting in plain view.

We would like to remind all residents to keep your vehicles locked at all times, including when they are sitting in your own driveway.

Do not leave valuables sitting in plain view in your vehicle whether it is locked or not.

We have also experienced a number of larcenies of catalytic converters from autos. They all appear to have been sawn off with hack or reciprocating saws. Either way the thief(s) are able to cut off a catalytic converter within one to four minutes.

In several of the instances, people heard suspicious noises and did not call 911. Depending on the converter the cost of replacement has been \$150 to \$800. If you hear or see anything you think is suspicious, please call 911 and report it. An officer will be sent to investigate ASAP.

55 Alive is a classroom refresher course designed to meet the specific needs of drivers 50 years of age or older.

It covers age-related physical changes, declining perceptual skills and develops safe, defensive driving techniques.

You do no have to be an AARP

member to attend. Some insurance companies offer a discount for attending this course.

It is recommended that this class be taken every three years.

The class is offered in the spring and in the fall, and held at the Hampton Township Hall. There is a minimal charge for the class.

The interior building paint was graciously donated by Meijer 's Store Director, Rob Short.



TRANSFER STATION IMPROVEMENTS

There have been some changes at our Transfer Station and more to come as the year goes on.

We now have a permanent sign at the entrance to the station, that posts the days and hours of operation, and general notices that our residents need to be informed of like this new one:

"WE CAN NO LONGER ACCEPT BUILD-ING MATERIALS DUE TO DEQ PROCESS-ING REQUIREMENTS. "

The DPW is working on removing all of the cement and rock that had been accumulated. The gate was moved back to the west and a berm was installed on each side with tree plantings

added to make it more aesthetically appealing.

For those who would like to use the nature trails, a parking lot in front of the gate has been added.

The roadway on the inside perimeter will be smoothed out making driving in and up to the compactors and recycling bins cleaner and easier to access.
